 - Your acceptance into the master's program
 - Anticipated date of graduation
 - A degree plan including education courses
 - RN licensure verification
- Attach two letters of reference regarding your professional work and commitment to nursing as well as your potential to teach.
- Attach a graduate and/or undergraduate transcript.

About Bobbie Anderson....Mrs. Anderson's career in associate degree nursing education spans twenty-four years, first as an instructor, then as program director, and finally as dean. When Mrs. Anderson's leadership of the associate degree nursing program at Hinds Community College began, it was a small department of 80 students and 8 faculty located in a small house. It grew to a division of 424 students and 38 faculty housed in a modern state-of-the-art facility, which Mrs. Anderson helped design. In the early 1980s, Mrs. Anderson joined with other state leaders in nursing to organize the Organization for Associate Degree Nursing. Mrs. Anderson helped ensure quality health care through her dedication and tireless efforts in promoting associate degree nursing education and practice. This scholarship will allow Mrs. Anderson's legacy to continue. It will enable future leaders in associate degree nursing education the opportunity to advance their knowledge and enhance and promote the value and worth of the associate degree nurse throughout the country.

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
